# **Important Notices**



### **Summer Road Closures**

Transportation - Summer 2025

- **1. Canal Main 34km CLOSED from AUGUST 10 - SEPTEMBER 30** the detour route of Kous/Kanyon will be in effect and should not cause any major issues.
- 2. Canal Main 40-43km (Old Lake Main section)
  CLOSED from MAY 20 JULY 1 the detour route
  for this one is Gracie Main/Riverside Main/Pass Main,
  which increases the travel time significantly. If this
  is an option you wish to take, contact Moses Towell,
  Department of Lands and Resources, to get appropriate
  maps.
- **3.** Hucuktlis Lake Main (formerly Henderson Main) TEMPORARY CLOSURES from JUNE 1 JULY 14 should only contribute to short wait times upon arrival.
- **4. Hucuktlis Lake Main (formerly Henderson Main) CLOSED from JULY 14 SEPTEMBER 30** full closure of this section of road cuts off any access to Ehthlateese and will require boat access. If you have a vehicle in the village, it is important to think about moving it out prior to this closure if you need access to it. As there is also ongoing logging on top of the road work, the Department of Lands and Resources has purchased a couple extra handheld radios that can be signed out at the Thunderbird and returned to the maintenance team in the village, or vice versa.

As the province continues its upgrades to the road to Ehthlateese, there will be several road closures during the summer season. The closures will be significant and will make driving into Ehthlateese quite difficult. We will be able to compensate with more boat shuttles as needed.

We will keep everyone up-to-date as the situations potentially change, but please plan ahead for any trips to and from Ehthlateese this summer.

# Studying Ocean Currents to Strengthen Oil Spill Response in Barkley Sound

The Lands and Resources team is collaborating with a research team from the University of British Columbia to study the surface ocean currents in the Maa-nulth Domestic Fishing Area (MDFA). Surface currents are a key driver in the movement of oil in the marine environment, and we hope that the data that is collected will help us be better prepared to respond to a spill.

Over the next year, several 'surface drifters' will be deployed within Barkley Sound and will move throughout the Sound, and the team will be able to track their movements to get a better sense of the circulation patterns. There are opportunities for citizens to participate and share any knowledge that they would like regarding oil spills or areas they would be particularly concerned about should a spill occur. # Reviving Chinook: Boosting Salmon Run with Fry Release and Monitoring

One of the Uchucklesaht Tribe's ongoing projects is to re-establish a sustainable run of Chinook salmon into the Hucuktlis River and Clemens Creek. Each May, approximately 100,000 Chinook fry are released into Clemens Creek and Hucuktlis Lake. The fry have their adipose fins clipped to mark them as hatchery-origin salmon and to distinguish them from any natural origin Chinook that may be present. These fish will return as three to five year old adults and will spawn in Clemens Creek to increase natural production of Chinook salmon.

To track the movement and survival of the released fry, the Department of Lands and Resources is operating a rotary screw trap in the lower Hucuktlis River, to capture and enumerate the fry as they migrate to sea. The rotary screw trap consists of a large cone suspended between two floating pontoons that funnel fish into an underwater holding tank. It is a useful tool that may provide us a better understanding of the fry's survival within Hucuktlis Lake and their migration timing, in comparison to their wild counterparts.

# Elk-Fish Trade Ceremony Strengthens Inter-Nation Bonds

From April 22 to 24, 2025, representatives from the Uchucklesaht Tribe Government traveled to the lands of the Shuswap Indian Band in Invermere, to participate in a meaningful and culturally rich Elk-Fish trade Ceremony.

Chief Wilfred Cootes, Executive Councillor Thomas Rush, Joshua Shaw, Matt Titian, Wendy Hayes, Cam Hepp, and Rachel Andolfatto represented Uchucklesaht at the gathering.

Upon arrival, the Uchucklesaht delegation was moved by the traditional welcoming extended by the Shuswap Indian Band hosts. Dressed in vibrant regalia, the hosts greeted all guests following traditional protocols with traditional singing and drumming, creating a welcoming start to the ceremonial events.

The exchange took place on April 23, marked by a beautifully arranged dinner and welcome speeches delivered in the native language of the hosts. Cultural Coordinator, Joshua Shaw delivered a moving speech in Nuu-chah-nulth on behalf of Uchucklesaht Tribe, which was well-received and appreciated by all. Adding to the spirit of cultural sharing, Executive Councillor Thomas Rush and Matt Titian offered a heartfelt song gifted by Thomas' mother.

As part of the trade, Uchucklesaht gifted seafood consisting of prawns, salmon, and halibut to the host Nation. In return, the Uchucklesaht delegation received elk meat.

This ceremonial trade is a powerful reminder of the importance of sharing, mutual respect, and cultural preservation. It honors our commitment to supporting each other through the stewardship of our traditional resources and the strengthening our Nation-to-Nation relationship.

The elk meat will be available for community distribution, and included as part of the food fish distributions.



On Saturday, April 26, 2025, the Uchucklesaht Tribe Government (UTG) proudly marked a major milestone, the completion of its first Climate Action Plan, at a community celebration held at Nucii.

This comprehensive plan outlines 50 short and long term actions UTG will take to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and adapt to the ongoing impacts of climate change within our territory. The development of the plan was led by the Department of Lands and Resources, in collaboration with expert consultants and a dedicated Climate Action Working Group made up of 23 Uchucklesaht citizens.

Valuable insights were also gathered through a community survey, completed by 61 citizens, ensuring

the plan reflects the voices and priorities of the wider Uchucklesaht community.

To document and share this journey, UTG created a short film titled "Uchucklesaht's Climate Action Story," which captures key moments and perspectives from the planning process.



#### Eligible applicants:

- Between 15-30 years of age with a Social Insurance Number and Class 5 driver's licence (preferred).
- · Physically fit, and able to lift up to 40lbs.
- Preference given to Uchucklesaht, Nuu-chah-nulth members, and Indigenous individuals.

#### Duties to include:

- Support/work closely with Lands and Resources (L&R) staff with various programs and activities, and preparing daily logs, field notes and compliance checks.
- Support habitat restoration projects (marine and terrestrial environments). Record and report environmental data using GPS and digital tools. Maintain trails, signage and infrastructure.
- Fisheries duties, such as assisting with catch monitoring, monitoring of the fishfence, community fish distributions, compliance reporting and data processing.
- Maintenance duties in remote areas, as required, such as building, minor carpentry, operation of small machinery, grounds work, etc.

#### Required qualifications:

Organized, stong communication skills. Ability to work independently and part of a team. Positive and professional attitude. Good physical fitness. Comfort around water, fishermen and boats. Ability to accommodate flexible hours. Preference to those with ability to operate a boat, and willingness to obtain a small vessel operators permit.
